


The Autumn Romahome Rally.

of the vehicle wing mirror.

Lightly finger tighten the two hex bolts onto the inner face of the housing to hold it to the wing mirror. Note that the mirror housing sits proud of the wing mirror. Position the housing with the U channel snug to the rim of the wing mirror to gain the deepest grasp before nipping

down the hexagon bolts locking the assembly together.

Finally, the mirror/bracket can be located to its square section socket in the housing and the locking cross headed screw Vaseline coated and re-assembled.

Wing and eye mirror adjustment

Adjusting the duo-wing mirrors is a personal thing but as a guide I adjust my <u>wing mirror</u> so that at the extreme inner edge of the mirror, I can just see the side of the van from the driving seat.

Any undertaking vehicle advancing beyond the NS <u>wing mirror</u> view will disappear into the blind zone but will still be seen in the <u>bug eye mirror</u>. This is valuable on motorways where faster merging traffic will generally want to get ahead of you and come up on your near side.

I will also give the bug eye a glance when manoeuvring on a roundabout to the exit to ensure that the near side lanes are clear, and that Lewis is not attempting his signature outside line overtake! Other areas of value are where because of the acute angle of a road junction, the van structure masks the view of the road, the bug eye will help indicate when safe to proceed.

Abroad this bug eye is a must on motorways to ensure that the lane you need to move into is clear of traffic when overtaking or from moving out from a roadside parking space.

I'm sure that I do not need to go on about the benefits of bug eye mirrors other than try to illustrate the difference in viewing angle gained when using the bug eye mirrors both for near side and off side of the vehicle.



Scenario, the red car is running in lane one.

Pic.2 The red car is approximately 1.5 meters to left of me and 2 meters beyond the rear of the van.

Pic.1 It is just visible in my wing mirror but clear in my NS <u>bug mirr</u>or.

Pic.3 Here the red car has advanced to abreast of me halfway up the van. It has disappeared from my wing mirror and not yet in my near side peripheral vision but still can be seen in the bug mirror.

I was approached some time ago as to where I had sourced my bug eye supplementary wing mirrors. At that time, I was unable to be very helpful as they had been obtained from a motorway service area whilst touring abroad and thought unavailable in the UK.

Just recently however, as a result of having to take avoidance action my NS [near side] bug mirror was caught and broken by an overhanging branch. I was distraught at the loss of the mirror becoming aware of just how much I have relied on it abroad and at home.

Recently however browsing the internet I discovered that they could now be sourced from a UK retailer.

I would commend getting bug eye mirrors as they provide an effective aid to safe driving by minimising the vehicle's blind zones. In my opinion they also aesthetically blend in with the existing wing mirrors enhancing the appearance of the vehicle.

Priced under a tenner for two mirrors, they can be found on eBay from **Homes-Stores** Trade Marketing [UK] Ltd, 41 Ferndale Grove, Bradford, BD9 4LE. Item ref; 384178025477. Description; <u>2pc Blind spot mirror wide angle</u>. *Other suppliers are available*.



Well wrapped and boxed they come semi assembled including a small hexagon spanner. [*but not the screwdriver as in the photo*]. Before commencing assembly to the vehicle, I suggest breaking the sharp edges from the metal "U" channel, and to it, preassembling the two

preassembling the two hexagon headed bolts just a few turns.

The mirror/bracket held with a cross headed screw must be separated from the bug

housing with some care. The cross headed screw through

the housing.

the back of the housing is tight, so make sure you are using a clean unworn screwdriver, or you will end up countersinking the screw head.

Separate the mirror bracket from its housing by gently easing them apart. It is a tight fit, not helped by there being little to get hold of the mirror being recessed into

Through the slot in the base of the mirror housing, fit the U channel [as indicated] prior to being located to the rim

LESSONS LEARNT

It's very unlikely that your service garage is going to report a developing problem with your gear shift mechanism.

If you have a petulant gear shift it would be worth having the "Gear selection connecting linkage" checked at you next service.

Note; Replacement of my linkage cost 45€ for parts. Labour was covered by the RAC insurance < £150.


Addendum

Of course, my first thought when all this happened, was that the breakdown was within the gear box and not just the gear selection linkage.

Asking for the gearbox to be checked for consequential damage and an oil change, I was advised that the gear box was ok adding that the Citroën Berlingo gearbox is "Sealed for life" and as such does not have oil changes. News of the former was good but the later raises more questions. Romahomes far exceed what may be an average 10-15 year working life of a regular van. Are we to assume that the life of the gearbox oil is infinite! If not at what mileage or number of year will it be beyond its viability and should be replaced?

I'll leave that question hanging with you. Answers by any means to the editor

A COMMON FAULT

OF THE BERLINGO!

Somewhat irked at such a declaration as with twenty years of regular servicing how is it that a recognised issue with the gear shift mechanism had not been added to be monitored within the routine servicing schedule.



Reference to the bible, "Haynes' workshop manual" it would seem

that up to 2005 they had had several changes in design. or with the introduction of new engines, they continued to perpetrate the same weakness.

Raising the issue with my garage they acknowledged that it was a known problem.

Challenged as to why it is not on the regular schedule to check for wear, the garage stated that little would be gained, as a visual inspection would not readily reveal whether or not there was likely to be an imminent failure of the mechanism.

On reflection thinking back, there had been occasions where possibly I had not been sensitive to the warning signs that there was a developing fault with the gear shift. Occasions where the shift baulked at engaging first gear from stationary, I had just assumed that I'd not declutched sufficiently. Other



symptoms were that the gear did not want to readily disengage or feeling that the shifting was not as slick as usual, becoming gummy. There being no clunking or grinding sounds it was easy to explain away the symptoms as a cold gear box or too hot or just personal lazy gear shifting.

Maintaining Connections.

Cosy Van 2t was purchased new in 2003, twenty-one years of driving and never a mechanical breakdown on the road! That was of course until this year as on our return from touring France at the "*gare de péage*" the first gear would not engage, and others were sticky and difficult.


We were on route to a campsite by the river Sarthe southwest of Le Mans, with increasing gear selection

difficulty we managed to nurse Cosy to the entrance before gear selection became impossible.

Time to call in the cavalry; RAC answered, a dual linguist soon understood our predicament and arranged for a breakdown service to attend. A minor panic was that the garage asked for the location of the vehicle, not the address but the global coordinates which eventually we were able to provide from our mobile navigation. Not having found a place to eat on route, we set about preparing a late lunch when the RAC phoned to advise that the garage was on its way and within half an hour a large truck appeared at the gate.

I demonstrated the problem the best I could and with the bonnet open, the engineer lay prone across the bay to reach over the back of the engine and grapple with the cause of the breakdown.

"It's a COMMON FAULT of the Berlingo!" he said. His prognosis even worse in that the knuckle joints of the selector rods had broken away and that Cosy would have to be taken to the garage for replacement parts to be fitted.



A new trauma arose in that we were asked to empty all contents, you will understand that at the end of an extended tour not only is there a lot of used kit but there are the

bottles and gifts and souvenirs filling any free space. An international three-way telephone discussion ensued, and it agreed that all could remain but likely uninsured. **SO OFF WENT THE VAN WITH OUR HOME PACKED IN IT!** Well, apart from items needed to survive on the campsite until the repair was completed.

We were fortunate that it being low season there was a vacant camping pod available to house us whilst the van was away.

I cannot say that camping in the Pod was the last word in glamping. We chose the super 2.5 Pods

Luscious Lamb.

Whilst a few of us (or maybe, many of us) love the exotic recipes , just a few (or many of u s) prefer to spend our valuable time either resting in our Romahomes, or exploring the area we have chosen for a break.

So, simple cooking is the answer.

Here is a simple recipe for the limited facilities in a Romahome.

Equipment.

Reading Glasses. A small saucepan.

Ingredients. A` Parslev Box' Lamb Casserole Microwaveable Meal.

Method.

Slide the cardboard outer packaging from the meal.

Remove the plastic seal.

Tip the contents into a small saucepan. (Two packs might be needed if there are two of you awaiting a meal.) Heat gently on a low gas.

Serve onto a dinner plate. (Two dinner plates if there are two of you.)

Enjoy.

Note.

Some similar meals by `Parsley Box' do not have potato as an ingredient.

Use the second cooker ring to heat a small tin of potatoes.

If you have one of the bigger `posh' Romahomes, you might even have a Microwave cooker. If so, just follow the instructions on the cardboard wrapper and pop it into the cooker.

Great magazine, by the way, there's always something helpful in it, plus I feel part of the Romahome family through it!



Have you heard of Pandy in Wales? It is 4.5 miles from Abergavenny in Wales and 20 miles on the A465 to Hereford, England.

From Northamptonshire, as always we took slow roads through middle England, and some of the West via the Cotswolds and pitched at the Caravan and Motorhome club site in Pandy.

Pitches vary in size, but Millie, although the smallest vehicle, appeared to be allocated the largest grass pitch giving us lots of space.
